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### One thousand MPS students at 'UNCF Empower Me Tour'

More than 1,000 Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) students flocked to the annual United Negro College Fund (UNCF) Empower Me Tour on Thursday, November 9, 2023 in downtown Milwaukee to learn about Historically Black Colleges and Universities (UBCUs) and other post-secondary schools.

Twenty-one of those students left with something more: merit scholarships of \$2,500 each courtesy of tour co-sponsor Wells Fargo, after submitting a transcript showing a Grade Point Avage (GPA) of 3.0 or higher, a letter of recommendation from a teacher, and an essay of up to 500 words on how the scholarship would help them. More students were offered scholarships from the schools attending the event.

Students also could apply to colleges and learn if they would be admitted. Schools that sent representatives to



the event at the Baird Center, 400 W. Wisconsin Ave., included HBCUs such as Bethune-Cookman University in Daytona Beach, FL; Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta, GA; Fisk University in Nashville, TN; and Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, MS. Schools in the University of Wisconsin System and other local schools such as Milwaukee Area Technical College also were represented.

To get students into the college spirit, the Riverside University High School drumline and Rufus King International High School cheerleaders welcomed MPS students arriving at the Baird Center.

Speakers welcoming students included Suzanne Jenkins, assistant vice president of corporations and foundations at UNCF, previously known as the United Negro

College Fund; Shantae Jenkins, senior vice president and the diversity, equity, and inclusion strategic investment leader at Wells Fargo; Ashlei Stevens, a television and radio host; Preston Cole, director of the Milwaukee Department of Administration; and Milwaukee Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Keith P. Posley, an alumnus of Tougaloo Collage. MPS also is a sponsor of the tour.

"You are truly who these colleges and universities have been waiting for," Posley told the students.

Besides speaking with college and university representatives, students attended sessions on topics such as paying for college, including scholarships and internships as options, and on HBCU culture, hearing about the diversity at the schools.

### A place at the table

I've shared before the description of an editorial cartoon my father kept pinned up in the vestibule of our church that made a deep impression on me I have never forgotten. It was a black and white drawing by the Pulitzer Prize-winning artist Herblock that was originally published in the Washington Post in October 1947. The picture showed a group of well-dressed, happy people sitting at a banquet table overflowing with place settings, goblets, and so much food the table cannot hold any more: a roast, gravy boats, bread and butter, covered dishes, heaping platters of sides. Hovering behind them and filling the rest of the image is a crowd of gaunt, wide-eyed hungry children dressed in rags. There are too many of these skeletal figures to count; the starving masses go on and on into the distance. Back at the table, one of the dinner guests is speaking cheerfully to his smiling companions. The caption reads: "Shall we say grace?"

Shall we say grace? In his last book, "Where Do We Go from Here: Chaos or Communi*ty?"* Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., wrote: "Not too many years ago, Dr. Kirtley Mather, a Harvard geologist, wrote a book entitled "Enough and to Spare." He set forth the basic theme that famine is wholly unnecessary in the modern world. Today, therefore, the question on the agenda must

read: "Why should there be hunger and privation in any land, in any city, at any table, when man has the resources and the scientific know-how to provide all mankind with the basic necessities of life?" Dr. King went on: "There is no deficit in human resources; the deficit is in human will...The well-off and the secure have too often become indifferent and oblivious to the poverty and deprivation in their midst. The poor in our countries have been shut out of our minds, and driven from the mainstream of our



societies, because we have allowed them to become invisible. Ultimately a great nation is a compassionate nation. No individual or nation can be great if it does not have a concern for 'the least of these'."

Do we have the will to be truly great? As Americans celebrate Thanksgiving in a few days, many people will indeed be deeply blessed and grateful to be able to gather with family and friends around a table that looks like the one in the cartoon, with

"enough and to spare." The tablecloth and menu might be fancier for the holiday, but in many homes, the basic sight of a table with enough food for everyone to eat what they like and go to bed full is an everyday occurrence. Thanksgiving may be the only meal of the year when some families pause together long enough to truly give thanks for the food in front of them.

But there are millions of others who never take a seat at the dinner table for granted. There were 44 million people in our nation living in food insecure households last year. These neighbors are likely not choosing between apple or pumpkin pie, but between paying for groceries or for rent, heat, electricity, medicine, or clothing. Pandemic-era emergency supports that helped close gaps in food insecurity ended in recent months, but hunger certainly did not. Yet some programs that parents and children rely on for essential food remain at risk for cuts. Until our nation makes a permanent change in "con-



cern for 'the least of these'," there will be millions still searching for their place at America's table of plenty.

I end with a grace.

God, we thank You for this food

for the hands that planted

for the hands that tended

for the hands that harvested it

for the hands that prepared it

for the hands that provided it

and for the hands that served it.

And we pray and will act for those without enough food in Your world and in our land of plenty.





### Don't let anyone fool you: The FDA action on menthol WILL save 'black lives'

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently issued a ruling on menthol cigarettes that puts action behind the words, "Black Lives Matter." The new policy prohibits the manufacture and sale of menthol cigarettes in the United States, an action research estimates found could save up to 654,000 lives, including more than 238,000 'black lives' over the course of 40 years.

Tobacco prevention and other health advocates, including local groups such as the Wisconsin African American Tobacco Prevention Network and Wisconsin Tobacco Prevention & Poverty Network, view the ruling as a step towards righting the historic wrongs of the tobacco industry against African American communities, which it targeted for decades with its deadly menthol products. But, as also evidenced throughout history, the tobacco industry does not plan to go down without a fight. It's wielding its many resources to wage a campaign of misinformation related to the menthol ban. Themes of these messages, which you might have seen published recently in a community



newspaper near you, include that the ban will create "illicit unregulated marketplaces for menthol," and most concerningly, "over policing of the black community; in other words, "targeting."

It's almost unconscionable that an industry that targets the black community using a wide variety of tactics, including point-ofsale ads, price promotions, sponsorship of events, and by co-opting black-serving institutions, is warning those same communities that they in fact, will be targeted when menthols are removed from the market.

No one should ever mistake the tobacco industry as a credible or trusted messenger. The successful campaign they wielded to push menthol as the black cigarette resulted in 88 percent of black smokers in Wisconsin using menthols, compared to 41 percent of white smokers. Nationwide more than 80 percent of African Americans who smoke use menthols, according to data from the Office on Smoking and Health. Sadly, tobacco use, namely menthol cigarette smoking, is a major contributor to the three leading causes of death for African Americans: heart disease, cancer, and stroke, with 45,000 blacks dying from smoking-related deaths each year in this country.

The menthol additive gave cigarettes a cooling effect, which made them easier to start and harder to quit. That same cooling effect also allowed for deeper inhales, resulting in stronger addictions. It's no accident that black smokers start smoking at a later age and smoke fewer cigarettes, but still experience more tobacco-related illness and death than their white counterparts.

Here's another major truth about the menthol ban. The FDA has said that it can't and won't enforce the ban against individuals who smoke or possess menthols. Saying the ban will result in over-policing is an example of the tobacco industry exploiting real issues in the community related to police brutality and mass incarceration. The FDA ban on menthol polices the producers and retailers of menthol, not the people who smoke them.

Here's one more fact. Many black smokers want to quit using menthols, and the ban will increase that number. One study estimates that the new policy will lead 923,000 smokers to quit, including 230,000 African Americans. And that's just in the first 13 to 17 months after a ban goes into effect. The Wisconsin African American Tobacco Prevention Network and its partners are working feverishly to help meet this demand by increasing awareness about the many free cessation services available in the area, including the Wisconsin Tobacco Quit Line (1-800-QUIT-NOW).



### 'Black Nativity by Langston Hughes' returns with new director and renewed vision




Black Arts MKE's cherished holiday tradition returns for its eighth year, with a reimagined and elevated experience. *Black Nativi*ty by Langston Hughes will grace the stage for one remarkable weekend from December 7 to December 10, 2023, at Wilson Theater at Vogel Hall, Marcus Center. This new and uplifting retelling of Hughes' timeless 1961 play telling the story of the Nativity from the African American perspective, unfolds in both Bethlehem and present-day Milwaukee, infusing the vibrancy of Af-

rican diaspora poetry, music, and dance, all presented by a captivating, all-black, Milwaukee area based cast.

This year's rendition welcomes a new director, and an artistic director. New director Ashley Jordan, a prominent Milwaukee-based actor and director, will work alongside artistic director Wanyah Frazier. Together, with a stellar creative team, they have embarked on an exhilarating journey to reinterpret this classic musical, rooted in the celebration of the black family. This season, they drew inspiration from a multitude of artistic influences, both historical and contemporary, to breathe new life into the show. Extensive historical research has informed their approach, drawing inspiration from icons like Alvin Ailey, who was part of Hughes' original cast, and incorporating lighting dream sequences reminiscent of iconic productions like *The Wiz*.

The creative team, conducted by Artistic Director, Wanyah Frazier, is dedicated to elevating the production in every aspect, including

Black Nativity is an anchor in the community and to those who experience cultural variations of the African, and African American diaspora."

According to artistic director Wanyah Frazier, "Creatively, Black Nativity will take audiences on a heartwarming journey of familial love, faith, and the creation of new family traditions and norms. Audiences will be inspired by relatable, but current family stories, a home reminiscent of Christmas, and entranced by a dreamlike vision of Bethlehem. Black Nativity represents a reclamation of the black narrative and a staple of the black creative culture. As we move into a period of 'Renaissance' in Milwaukee's creative environment, we have the opportunity to create a rendition of Black Nativity that provides an intergenerational, culturally expansive and professional arts experience.'




