UNCF Milwaukee hosts '11th Annual Mayor's Masked Ball' scholarship fundraiser



The 11th Annual United Negro College Fund (UNCF) Milwaukee Mayor's Masked Ball was held on Saturday, February 7, 2026, at the Pfister Hotel, 424 E. Wisconsin, Ave.

Hosted by the Honorable Mayor Cavalier Johnson, the Mayor's Masked Ball raises scholarship dollars for local students attending Historically Black Colleges and Universities supported by UNCF. Support is also provided to students attending non-UNCF colleges.

Over the past ten years, the UNCF Mayor's Masked Ball has raised nearly \$1.6 million to support UNCF student scholarships.

"As Milwaukee continues to attract new businesses and create new opportunities, it is important to have a highly qualified workforce," said Mayor Johnson. "Support from the community helps encourage local young people to return to Milwaukee and to begin professional careers that benefit them, their families, and the greater community."

Milwaukee County unveils mural, plaque, and history wall honoring Marcia P. Coggs

The mural and history wall, entitled, "Marcia P. Coggs: The Conscience of Wisconsin - A Call to Serve in Love, Unity, and Peace" combine historic photographs, cultural symbolism, and artistic interpretation to highlight her impact on justice, equity, and human services in Milwaukee County and beyond.

Following the dedication, guests were invited to remain as a live studio audience for the taping of the Department of Health and Human Services podcast, "Conversations to Creating a Healthy Community." Hosted by DHHS Executive Director Shakita LaGrant-McClain, the episode featured a discussion on Marcia P. Coggs' legacy, the significance of the new building, and the future of accessible, high-quality human services. The dedication represents a powerful collaboration between public art and public service, creating a space where history, culture, and human dignity are honored daily through the work done inside the building.

On Thursday, February 5, 2026 at the Marcia P. Coggs Health and Human Services Center, 1230 W. Cherry St. County Executive David Crowley, in partnership with the Department of Health and Human Services and County Supervisor Priscilla E. Coggs-Jones, hosted a historic mural unveiling, plaque installation, and history wall dedication honoring Marcia P. Coggs, Wisconsin's first Black female state legislator.

The event which is part of the city's Black History Month celebrations, brought together elected officials, community leaders, artists, staff, and members of the Coggs family to celebrate a new public art installation that tells the story of Marcia P. Coggs' life and legacy. Marcia was widely known as "the conscience of the State of Wisconsin." Her decades of public service were guided by her enduring motto: Love, Unity, and Peace.

Burger King franchise group accused of hundreds of child labor violations at Wisconsin restaurants

Gov. Tony Evers says the Department of Workforce Development uncovered 1,656 infractions across the state

Gov. Tony Evers says a Wisconsin Burger King franchise owner had 1,656 child labor and wage payment law violations over a two-year span at its restaurants across the state.



Those allegations include 14 and 15-year-olds starting work without a child labor permit, minors working six-hour or longer shifts without a required break, and children under 16 working before or after the hours permitted for school-age workers, or working more hours than they were given.

"My administration and I are committed to cracking

down on fraud and abuse impacting Wisconsin work-

ers, most especially our kids, and we will continue this good work to ensure our laws are working for the folks and families we serve," Evers said in a news release.

Evers says the violations, which included more than 600 children from 2023 to 2025, are the largest amount of child labor and wage payment infractions in modern Wisconsin history.

The franchisee in question, Cave Enterprises, runs 105 Burger King locations in Wisconsin, some right here in Milwaukee.

The Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development is ordering Cave Enterprises to pay more than \$237,000 in unpaid wages to the employees affected, and penalties of up to \$828,000 (\$500 per violation for the 1,656 infractions).

"For kids who choose to work, child labor laws provide essential protection to ensure that they can continue to do well in school and enjoy the best parts about growing up in Wisconsin while staying safe in the workplace," DWD Secretary Amy Pechacek said.

Evolve Church housing initiative helps Milwaukee mom buy her first home

Two years ago, Evolve Church in Milwaukee launched the Single Mother Housing Initiative, a program created to support single mothers facing financial disparities by offering stability, financial relief, and a pathway to homeownership. This week, the program reached a major milestone as its first participant officially purchased her own home.



Shaunte, a single mother of three, is the first mom to complete the program and achieve homeownership. For her, the accomplishment represents more than just buying a house — it marks a new beginning for her family.

Before entering the program, Shaunte says she was sleeping on a mattress. Through the Single Mother Housing Initiative, she then spent about 18 months living in a three-bedroom home provided by Evolve Church in Northern Milwaukee County. Now, she has reached another milestone — becoming the owner of a four-bedroom home of her own.

During her time in the program, Evolve Church provided more than housing. Participants receive financial coaching, guidance, and support designed to model what homeownership looks and feels like. Shaunte says

that experience reshaped her mindset and helped her move forward.

"It really just made me not succumb to what my circumstances were at the moment," Shaunte said. "It just really made me say, 'Hey, this is what I want to do. I just have to put the work in to do it.'"

Shaunte was one of just two mothers selected from more than 1,300 applicants. In addition to housing, the church provided a \$5,000 grant toward homeownership

and an additional \$2,000 for furniture. Shaunte says her journey is proof that progress doesn't always look the same for everyone.

"The process is not always nice-looking," she said. "Everything works out in your due time. Just keep going. Good things come to those who work hard and who love the Lord."

To qualify for the Single Mother Housing Initiative, applicants must have at least one child, show three years of stable employment, maintain a minimum credit score of 580, and pass a criminal background check.

Now a homeowner, Shaunte says her three boys are already making plans to decorate their new rooms. The family plans to move into their new home over Valentine's Day weekend.

Program leaders say Shaunte's success reflects what's possible when opportunity meets consistent support. Brenda Kirk, program director of the Single Parent Initiative, says witnessing the first mom in the program reach this milestone was a powerful moment.

"Watching the very first mom in our program purchase her home was such a powerful moment," Kirk said. "Through months of coaching, encouragement,

and walking through the ups and downs together, we witnessed her perseverance firsthand. I feel incredibly grateful to be part of a journey where we get to see what once seemed impossible be-

come possible." Kirk added that seeing single parents grow in confidence and step into stability is what makes the work meaningful.

Can he really do that? Black History Month in the age of Trump

A celebration is acceptable only when it becomes a sanitized MAGA vision of America.

Last year, shortly after his second inauguration, President Donald Trump issued a proclamation on January 31 to mark the start of Black History Month the next day—just as presidents before him had done, beginning with Gerald Ford in the bicentennial year of 1976. He invoked “heroes such as Frederick Douglass, Harriet Tubman, Thomas Sowell, Justice Clarence Thomas, and countless others [who] represent what is best in America and her citizens.” A well-known golf enthusiast, he paid special tribute to Tiger Woods, one of many “who have pushed the boundaries of excellence in their respective fields.” Hailing the arrival of “a historic Golden Age,” Trump extended gratitude to “black Americans” (notably a lower case “B”) “for all they have done to bring us to this moment.”

A few weeks later, Trump hosted a Black History Month reception at the White House. Tiger Woods, wearing his Presidential Medal of Freedom (2019), was the guest of honor and gave brief remarks. The president acknowledged other attendees, including Senator Tim Scott (R-SC) and former NFL player Scott Turner, newly confirmed as the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. The president touted his connections to the African-American community and paid tribute to “the generations of black legends, champions, warriors, and patriots who helped drive our country forward to greatness.”

Though nobody there mentioned it, Trump’s 2025 Black History Month reception took place in the shadow of a previous order from January 20, terminating “illegal” Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility offices and initiatives across all agencies of the federal government. According to the president, Americans deserved a government that hired and fired solely based on merit. Previous DEIA programs, the order stated, had not only been “[an] immense public waste,” but also an example of “shameful discrimination.” On the same day Trump proclaimed the start of Black History Month, his Secretary of Defense, Pete Hegseth, issued his own stark directive: “Identity Months Dead at DoD.”

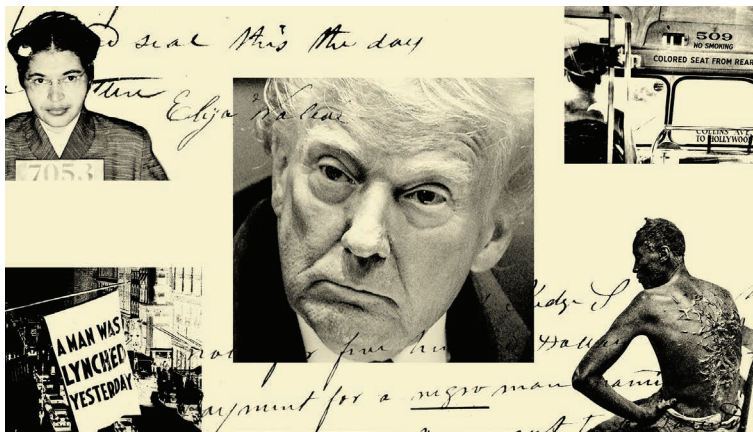
Fast forward to February 2026, and Trump’s latest Black History Month proclamation is something vastly different, both at the rhetorical level and in its deep-

er meaning. It begins in the usual way, by recognizing America’s Black heroes and “legends” (used, unironically, in its colloquial form), but then it veers into subtle diatribe. “As president, I proclaim that ‘black history’ is not distinct from American history—rather, the history of black Americans is an indispensable chapter in our grand American story.” Sticking with the lower case “B” in all references to Black people and Black history, Trump has further twisted the shape and meaning of Black History Month. What other presidents have recognized as a month for community education and public acknowledgement—a celebration of African-American achievements, but also an observance of past injustices—Trump has harnessed for his own purposes. Black History Month, perhaps unsurprisingly, has become a battleground of memory and a new front in MAGA’s broader culture war.

From a historian’s perspective, Trump’s attempt to co-opt and reconstrue Black History Month isn’t surprising. In the courses I teach on “History and Memory” and “The Politics of History,” students learn that presidents have always taken a role in the construction of American collective memory. Presidents make history at two levels: first, by taking decisions and implementing policies that change the lives of millions (or billions), but also by invoking and narrating the past in their own, often idiosyncratic, ways. They do this to influence how they will be seen in the future, but also to legitimate (and lubricate) the exercise of power while still in office.

Whether Democrat or Republican, progressive or conservative, presidents have always instrumentalized the past to advance their political agendas. On the way to the 1776 Bicentennial, Presidents Johnson and Nixon both tried to orchestrate the celebration to calm and manage the crises of the day: Vietnam, the struggle for civil rights, urban unrest, student protests, and economic recession. In their inaugural speeches and State of the Union Addresses, presidents spin historical yarns and elaborate their platforms through historical analogies and homespun presentations of the past. All of that is normal, even if, for historians, these presidential forays into history can be exasperating.

Trump’s efforts to change



the shape and meaning of Black History Month are something different. The production of historical knowledge, whether by presidents or academics, always reveals and depends on the existing power structure. It always entails distillation, sanitization, selectivity, and, of course, who gets a say when it comes to giving the past its meaning. No interpretation of the past is apolitical, but the question of power also begs the question of moral vision and practical outcomes.

To what purpose and in support of what principles and values do we put our investigations of the past? When we explain and interpret the past, we do so in pursuit of knowledge and understanding—but to what end? What other goals shape and drive historical inquiry besides familiarity with the facts? Facilitating justice by accepting responsibility for past violations and abuses committed in our names? Or is the purpose of the past merely to maintain the hierarchies of knowledge, opportunity, and citizenship that deliver benefits to some while sidelining and brutalizing others?

It isn’t Trump’s sophomore dabbling in history that is unusual; it is his determination to use the past for baldly illiberal purposes. Not for the purpose of affirming the uniqueness and dignity of all individuals and groups, but to force all Americans into a framework that appears to be neutral on the outside, even as it gives credence and political standing to some groups more than others. What makes Trump’s history dangerous is how it camouflages identity politics with a slick veneer of group neutrality. Not the identity politics of the last 40 years, for which MAGA has so much contempt, but the identity politics of an earlier age, when Black equality may have existed on paper, but Black Americans faced cruel and violent barriers to full citizenship, and American history, where it featured Black

bodies, rarely incorporated Black voices.

Consider, again, Trump’s use of language in his 2026 Black History Month proclamation. At first, he sticks with familiar tropes that recall the nation’s origins: “America’s founding was rooted in the belief that every man, woman, and child is created equal, ‘endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights,’ and free to live [...] in ‘pursuit of Happiness.’” But things soon take a dark and radical turn. “For decades, the progressive movement and far-left politicians have sought to needlessly divide our citizens on the basis of race, painting a toxic, and distorted, and disfigured vision of our history, heritage, and heroes.” Yes, this certainly sounds dire, but fear not, Trump will correct the nation’s course, as only he can. “This month [...] we do not celebrate our differences. Instead, we celebrate the contributions of black Americans to our national greatness and their enduring commitment to the American principles of liberty, justice, and equality.”

Throughout the proclamation, Trump pulls in two opposite directions. On the one hand, there is an inclusive, even charitable, aspect. Black history is seemingly accepted and embraced here. It should be viewed, Trump declares, as “indispensable.” His language melds Black history with American history, imbuing it with grandeur. Black patriots, he says, have been “the vanguards of our freedom” and are “some of the most heroic Americans to have ever lived.” The emphasis is on the unum in our nation’s oft-cited motto: e pluribus unum (out of many, one).

On the other hand, for many African-Americans, it will be hard not to feel slighted. Trump frames Black history in language

that suggests it does not—indeed, by implication, it cannot—stand on its own. It exists to be subsumed into something broader and deeper. There is no singular Black experience in America’s past, it seems, except what Trump and MAGA choose to remember. You can see this in Trump’s 1776 history project, where Martin Luther King, Jr., appears, unfathomably, as a warrior in the fight against reverse racism.

The scare quotes around “black history” (“I proclaim that ‘black history’ is not distinct from American history...”) are also telling. Black history isn’t history at all, but only a kind of pseudo “history.” It may entail real events and real people, but, until it is absorbed into the MAGA past, it holds no real value. When Trump said, during a Black History Month event in 2017, that the 19th century abolitionist Frederick Douglass was “an example of somebody who’s done an amazing job and is being recognized more and more,” some saw his framing as yet another product of his narcissism. But it is also an example of how Trump appeals to the past while simultaneously ransacking and appropriating it for his own purposes. If Trump could copyright or affix a trademark to the past—not to mention monetize it—does anyone believe he would miss that chance?

In the next section, the president invokes that hardy perennial, the Declaration of Independence—2026 being the country’s Semiquincentennial—and he cites America’s “bedrock belief in equality.” The word “bedrock” does a lot of heavy lifting here, signaling something consolidated and foundational. For Trump, equality is enmeshed deep in America’s historical DNA. The nation’s history is the story of its genomic expression, and in Trump’s world, that DNA must remain pure. Anything that doesn’t fit must be excised. The text continues: “The source of our strength is rooted not in our differences, but in our shared commitment to freedom under one beautiful American flag.” One people, one nation, one history. Every strand of the past must be smoothed, with no ends left frayed. You can almost imagine Trump in the archives, sorting through America’s messy past with a hot iron and a pair of golden scissors.

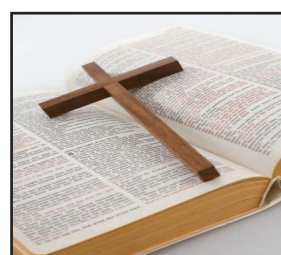

The truth about what happened to Charles Drew

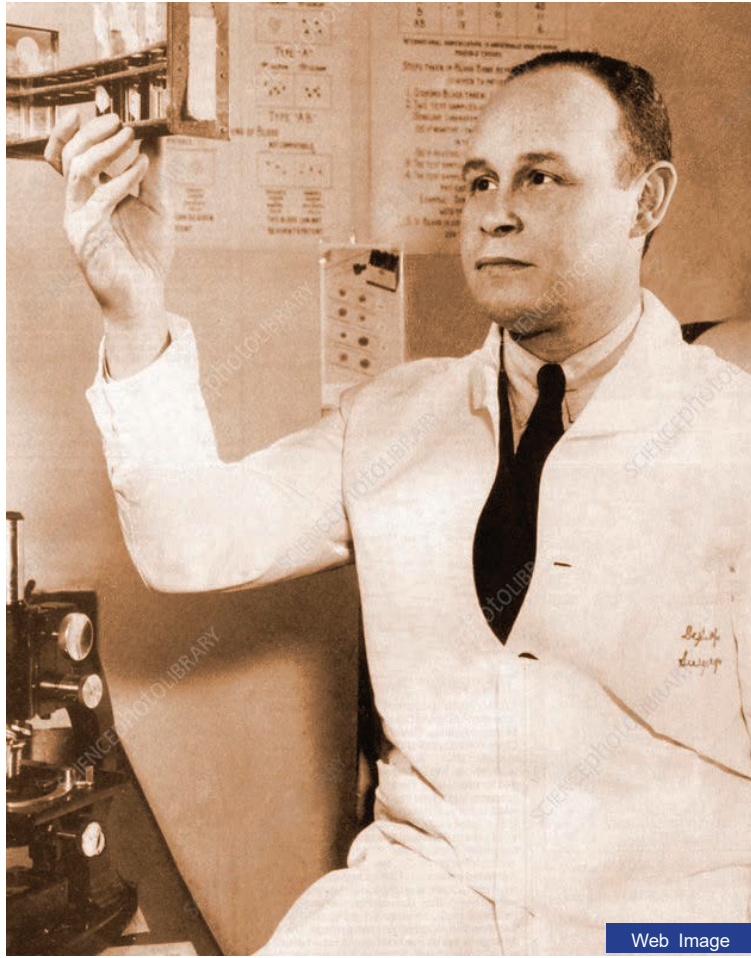
Who was Charles Drew?

Black physician Charles Richard Drew invented “blood banks.” He led blood plasma projects in the US and UK during WWII, but left due to a court requiring segregation of African American blood. On April 1, 1950, he died.

Education

After earning his bachelor’s degree at Amherst in 1926, Drew couldn’t afford medical school. Morgan College, now Morgan State University, near Baltimore, employed him as a biology lecturer and coach for two years. In 1928, he applied to medical schools and enrolled at McGill University in Montreal.

Drew was an outstanding student at McGill: a neuroanatomy award winner and an Alpha Omega Alpha medical honor society member. Dr. Drew graduated second in 1933 with a Doctor of Medicine and Master of Surgery. The Royal Victoria and Montreal General Hospitals hosted his internship and residency. Drew explored blood

transfusion concerns with Dr. John Beattie.

After his father’s death, Drew returned to America. In 1935, he taught at Howard’s medical school. He worked at the university and

then conducted a surgical residency at Freedmen’s Hospital in Washington, DC, the following year.

Father of blood banks

Drew studied at Columbia University and trained at

Presbyterian Hospital in New York City on a 1938 Rockefeller Fellowship. He continued his blood research with John Scudder. Drew processed and preserved blood plasma or cellless blood. Plasma is more stable than whole blood and may be “banked” longer. He found that plasma could be dried and regenerated. His doctoral thesis, “Banked Blood,” was based on his study. He graduated in 1940 and was the first black Columbia graduate.

Drew led the “Blood for Britain” medical effort during World War II. He collected and processed blood plasma from various New York hospitals and sent it abroad to treat war casualties. Drew helped collect 14,500 plasma pints, one story said.

In 1941, Drew led another American Red Cross blood drive. He developed a US military blood bank. Drew felt dissatisfied with the military’s proposal to segregate African American blood donations soon after joining. The military initially opposed using African American blood but subsequently allowed it for African American troops. After a few months, Drew quit in protest of this bigoted stance.

Death and legacy

Drew returned to Howard University in 1941 after founding two blood banks. He directed the university’s surgical department as a professor and became Freedmen’s Hospital’s principal surgeon. Later that year, he became the first black American Board of Surgery examiner.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People awarded Drew

the 1943 Spingarn Medal for “the finest and noblest accomplishment” by an African-American in the previous year or years in 1944. Drew was honored for his blood plasma collection and distribution.

He was at his career height before his death. He was the solitary fatality of four passengers in his automobile on April 1, 1950, like a terrible April Fool’s trick. Two white physicians at the segregated hospital where he was transported recognized him and fought to rescue him. Due to his injuries, he died from massive blood loss. Eight months after Drew’s death, Maltheus Avery, a 24-year-old veteran, died in a vehicle accident in rural North Carolina. Years later, the myth was attributed to Drew. Avery died on the way to a Negro hospital after Duke University Hospital turned him away due to its packed “black beds” (15 of 120).

The truth

However, over time, evidence has appeared to refute the story. Alamance County General Hospital, which separated white and black patients, treated Drew in 1950. According to eyewitnesses from the automobile collision and medical workers, plasma was given to Drew in addition to other emergency care.

Drew’s death certificate indicated “brain damage, internal hemorrhage—lungs and several extremities injuries,” indicating he died from more than blood loss. In 1984, the Journal of the National Association of Medicine (Apr. 76(4): 415–416) disproved the myth by presenting Dr. Walter R. Johnson’s firsthand account of Drew’s injury and treatment.

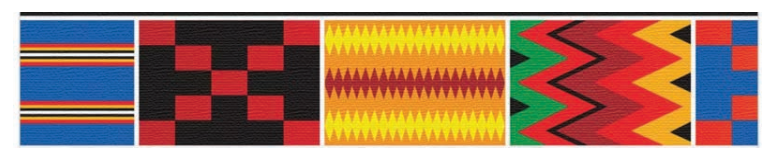

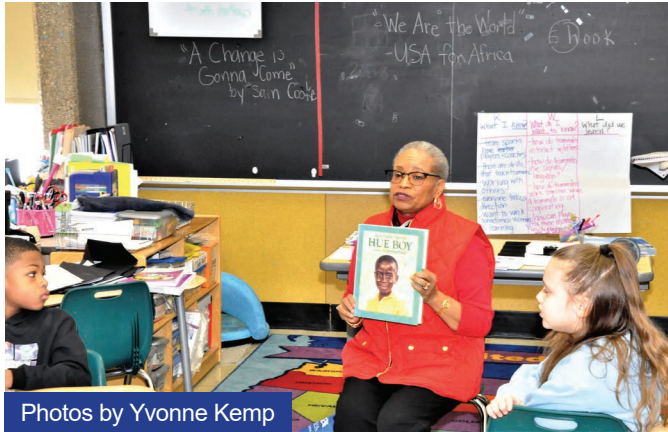

"Seeing single parents push through obstacles, grow in confidence, and step into stability and homeownership is truly an honor," she said.

Shaunte hopes her story encourages other single mothers who may feel discouraged or tempted to compare their progress to others.

"Anything is possible," Shaunte said. "Change your mindset, make a plan and write it down, stay focused, and do the work. Of course, being a single parent isn't easy, but even when you don't feel like you have family support, you also have God and other people around you who want to see you win."

She also shared a reminder for those who may feel behind.

"Do not give up," she said. "Some people are able to buy a home in one year, and some aren't. I was doing that a lot — comparing. I felt like I had to catch up, but everything works out in your due time, so just keep going."

Research including MPS shows impact of Montessori education on kindergartners

A new national study that included Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) shows the positive impact a Montessori education has on kindergartners — on everything from reading to memory to social development.

Thriving at Riley

When Dana Schultz's daughter, Octavia, was in kindergarten at MPS's Riley Dual Language Montessori School, she would read simple books to the other children. Even if she didn't know every single word, "she would act like the teacher and show them the pictures and explain to them. She really thrived as a leader," her mother said.

Octavia is now a 1st grader there. Similarly, Ms. Schultz's son, Anton, now in 3rd grade at Riley, would work with his classmates. "My son was always really good at math. He likes the role of helping other kids with the math blocks and number chains," she said. It was an opportunity for him to show what he knew.

Marisol Garcia has seen those qualities of leadership and emotional and social growth, too, in her four school-aged children, all Riley Montessori students since preschool.

"I've noticed that they are a lot more independent than they were before; they're a lot more responsible," she said.

Her oldest, 3rd-grader Rafael, watches out for the others. "He helps out with his younger siblings a lot, without me having to ask him," she said.

Her 4-year-old, Jesus, shows initiative: "He knows where to store his shoes, where to hang his coat, where his bookbag goes."

Five-year-old daughter Arit already can write her name in cursive. Second-grader David can read very quickly in Spanish, thanks to Riley's dual language program, and is very quick when it comes to math. "When I ask him what's 17 plus 35, he knows it."

Both Ms. Schultz's children have been students at Riley since they were in 3-year-old kindergarten. Ms. Garcia's children have been enrolled since preschool, as well.

Public Montessori research

A new national study conducted by researchers from the University of Virginia and the University of Pennsylvania finds that the usual "preschool slide" that happens in 5-year-old kindergarten did not occur with Montessori students who had been enrolled in Montessori

as 3- and 4-year-olds.

Instead, children in the study — which included MPS Montessori schools as well as other public Montessori schools around the country — were doing significantly better at the end of kindergarten on their reading, short-term memory, executive function (working memory, impulse control, and adaptable thinking), and social development, and also somewhat better at math.

For the study, researchers followed 588 children for three years in 24 public Montessori schools. In addition to Milwaukee, the schools were in Arlington, Virginia; Bal-



timore; Buffalo, New York; Dallas; Denver; the District of Columbia; Fort Collins, Colorado; Hartford, Connecticut; Nashville; and Racine.

The study, "A National Randomized Controlled Trial of the Impact of Public Montessori Preschool at the End of Kindergarten," is the

second such extended study conducted at MPS Montessori schools. Research from the first, included in the book "The Science Behind the Genius," was conducted at Craig Montessori School.

Nurtured in community

Montessori intentionally has children ages 3, 4, and 5 together in one space so that they naturally learn together as well as learn from each other; the oldest children serve as role models and help the younger students. The teacher gives the children small group and individual lessons, but learning largely is hands on with special Montessori

materials and at children's own speed. Having the 3-, 4-, and 5-year-olds learning together is thought to be a reason why children become leaders by the time they reach Montessori kindergarten.

Dana Schultz, the parent whose two children attend Riley, said, "More than anything, I want my children to love learning. That's a skill that's going to last a lifetime. Who knows what the job market and the economy is going to look like in 20 years, but if their curiosity is nurtured and they love to learn, there's going to be a place for them."

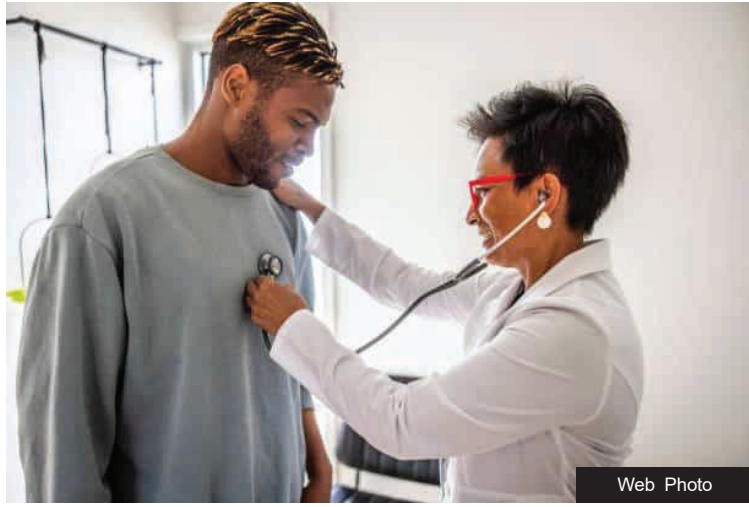

Silent killers: Detecting the first signs of heart conditions

Heart conditions seldom make their presence known with loud warnings or obvious signals. Often, it starts in a hushed manner—subtle changes in breathing, energy, or pace that can easily go unnoticed in the hustle and bustle of everyday life. These first warning signs, though easy to miss, might be the body's first subtle indicators that something isn't quite right. Let's explore how heart conditions can develop unnoticed, why early detection is critical, how recognizing even the slightest signs can mean the difference between preventing a crisis and experiencing one, and lifestyle adjustments that can reduce risk.

Now, you're probably thinking to yourself, "How is it even possible to miss warning signs when it comes to the heart?"—especially because the heart is vital. The heart is our central pump, and its main function is to move blood throughout our body. Well, let's discuss. It's because heart conditions lack loud, dramatic symptoms—they start mild and/or non-specific, vague, and are easily overlooked. For example, an individual might push through symptoms, assuming they're just super tired or really anxious, but really it's a serious heart condition that

is developing slowly. This is why routine health check-ins and awareness matter so much. Learning of any heart issues or conditions early often depends on noticing subtle changes before they escalate into loud emergencies.

I bet you'll be surprised at some of these subtle "silent" killers:

- Jaw pain
- Persistent cough
- Shortness of breath
- Wheezing
- Sudden, unexplained nausea
- Mild indigestion
- Unexplained fatigue
- Unexplained sweating without physical exertion
- Fluid buildup, which leads to swelling in the legs, ankles or feet
- Dizziness/lightheadedness

- Chest discomfort/tightness
- Chest tightness when sneezing or coughing
- Sleep disturbances

Recognizing even the slightest signs can mean the difference between preventing a crisis and experiencing one. Heart conditions are life-threatening. Early detection is critical and matters for prevention, as intervention can greatly enhance treatment outcomes/results and reduce the risk of serious heart conditions, such as:

Heart failure: a chronic condition in which the heart is unable to pump enough blood to meet the body's needs. Now, this doesn't mean the heart has stopped working—rather, it means the heart's pumping ability has become weaker or less

efficient, causing blood and fluid to back up in the lungs, legs, and other parts of the body.

Heart attack (Myocardial Infarction): occurs when blood flow to part of the heart muscle is suddenly blocked, usually by a blood clot in a narrowed coronary artery. Without oxygen-rich blood, the affected heart muscle begins to suffer damage or die within minutes.

Coronary Artery Disease (CAD): happens when the blood vessels that bring oxygen and nutrients to your heart become narrow or clogged by fatty buildup. This makes it harder for blood to reach your heart.

Arrhythmia is a problem with the heart's rhythm—when the heart beats too fast, too slow, or in an irregular way, which can affect how well blood is pumped throughout the body.

Cardiomyopathy is a disease of the heart muscle that makes it weaker, thicker, or stiffer than normal, so the heart has trouble pumping blood the way it should.

Valvular heart disease: happens when one or more of the heart's valves don't open or close the way they should, making it harder for blood to flow through the heart and causing the heart to work way harder than normal.

Cardiac arrest is a sudden, life-threatening condition where the heart stops beating effectively, causing blood flow to the brain and body to stop.

Lifestyle risk factors significantly contribute to the onset of severe heart conditions by placing ongoing strain on the cardiovascular system. When unhealthy lifestyle habits continue over the years, they intensify and worsen each other, accelerating heart damage and diminishing the heart's capacity to function efficiently—and this is never good for anyone.

Here are some lifestyle risk factors:

- A family history of serious heart conditions
- An unhealthy diet, high in saturated fats, trans fats, sodium and cholesterol
- Lack of regular physical activity / everyday movement
- Chronic stress
- Obesity
- High cholesterol
- High blood pressure

Embracing healthier lifestyle choices can play a pivotal role in reducing these health risks and enhancing heart health over the long term.

Lifestyle adjustments that can reduce the risks of heart conditions:

- If you smoke, quit! Smoking damages the blood vessels, raises heart rate, raises blood pressure, increases blood clots, and lowers oxygen to the heart.
- Eat a balanced diet (fruits and vegetables, proteins, whole grains, healthy fats)
- Engage in regular exercise (walking, running, swimming, biking, playing sports, etc.)
- Maintain a healthy weight (eat smart, participate in everyday movement, etc.)
- Manage stress (organize your day, sleep well, exercise, practice relaxation techniques, find creative outlets, etc.)
- Limit alcohol intake, as it slowly weakens the heart muscle, triggers abnormal heart rhythms, can raise stroke risk and promotes inflammation.

Practical steps for monitoring heart health:

1. Schedule regular check-ups or consult with a trusted healthcare provider, especially when experiencing chest pain, fainting or severe weakness, coughing up foamy mucus that's pink or white, rapid or irregular heartbeat.
2. When being active (running, walking, working out, climbing stairs, etc.) notice tolerance. Ask yourself if these activities feel harder to do than they normally would.
3. Pay attention to symptoms. Are you experiencing unexplained dizziness, chest discomfort, swelling, or unusual fatigue?
4. Keep track of your blood pressure, blood sugar, cholesterol and body weight. These numbers give you early cues about heart health and any potential risks that you may be facing.
5. Occasionally, check your pulse, as this will help you notice if your heartbeat feels unusually fast, slow, or even irregular.

Heart conditions may develop subtly, yet their consequences can be life-altering when left unnoticed. By identifying the initial signs, paying close attention to your body's signals, and consulting with a trusted healthcare provider before minor changes become major problems, you gain a powerful advantage over these silent killers. Awareness is not about fear—it's about being prepared. Spotting the initial signs of heart conditions early can save lives, safeguard long-term health and wellness, and turn subtle signs into opportunities for early intervention—timely care, treatment and prevention.





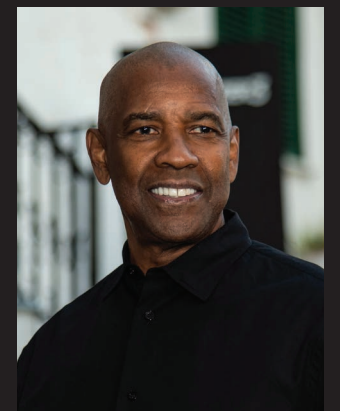

- 1 3/4 ounces brandy
- 2 1/2 ounces freshly squeezed Florida Grapefruit Juice
- 1/3 ounce simple syrup, or to taste
- 2 dashes bitters
- 1 egg white
- ice cubes
- 1 ounce sparkling water
- Florida Grapefruit twist, for garnish

In cocktail shaker, add brandy, Florida Grapefruit juice, simple syrup, bitters and egg white. Shake vigorously 15-20 seconds to create frothy texture.

Prep time: 30 minutes
Cook time: 3 minutes
Servings: 4

- 2 Florida Grapefruit
- 1 fennel bulb
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, plus additional for searing, divided
- 1 tablespoon sherry vinegar
- 1/8 teaspoon, plus 1 pinch, salt, divided, to taste
- 1/8 teaspoon, plus 1 pinch, pepper, divided, to taste
- 1 small bunch fresh cilantro
- 12 scallops with empty shells
- 1 tablespoon butter

Peel and cut one Florida Grapefruit into segments. Squeeze remaining grapefruit and reserve juice.

Wash and finely chop fennel. In bowl, mix fennel with olive oil, sherry vinegar and 1 pinch salt and pepper.

Mix and add fresh cilantro. Keep a few leaves for garnish.

In hot frying pan, drizzle with olive oil then sear scallops 1 minute on each side.

Remove scallops from pan then deglaze with reserved Florida Grapefruit juice. Let it simmer slightly and add butter to make sauce. Add 1/8 teaspoon salt and pepper.

Place 1 tablespoon fennel salad in washed shell, top with three scallops and coat with grapefruit butter.

Florida Citrus Vinaigrette:

- 1/3 cup Florida Grapefruit Juice
- 1/3 cup Florida Orange Juice
- 2 teaspoons orange zest
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 2 teaspoons honey
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons shallots
- sea salt, to taste
- fresh pepper, to taste

Pickled Onion:

- 1 red onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup white vinegar or cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt

Burrata Salad:

- 4 Florida Grapefruit, peeled and cut into segments
- 3 oranges, peeled and cut into segments
- 1 bunch radishes, sliced thin and cut into sticks
- 1/3 cup pistachios, grilled and coarsely chopped
- 1 cup arugula
- 2 tablespoons dill, chopped
- sea salt, to taste
- pepper, to taste
- 8 ounces burrata

To make vinaigrette: In small bowl, mix Florida Grapefruit Juice, Florida Orange Juice, orange zest, cider vinegar, honey, Dijon, olive oil and shallots until dressing is emulsified. Season with salt and pepper, to taste. Set aside. Vinaigrette will keep 7 days in refrigerator.

To make pickled onion: Place sliced onion in airtight canning jar. In small saucepan, combine vinegar, water, sugar and salt. Bring to boil and pour over sliced onion in jar. Add small amount of water to completely cover onion.

Refrigerate at least 2 hours before serving. Pickled onions will keep 15 days in refrigerator.

To make burrata salad: In bowl, combine Florida Grapefruit and Orange segments; add radish sticks, toasted pistachios, arugula and dill. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.

Place salad on large plate, top with coarsely chopped burrata and drizzle generously with citrus vinaigrette and pickled onion.
