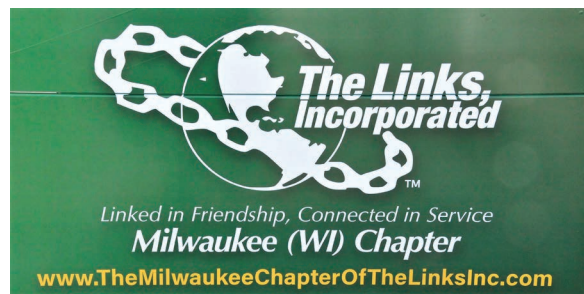
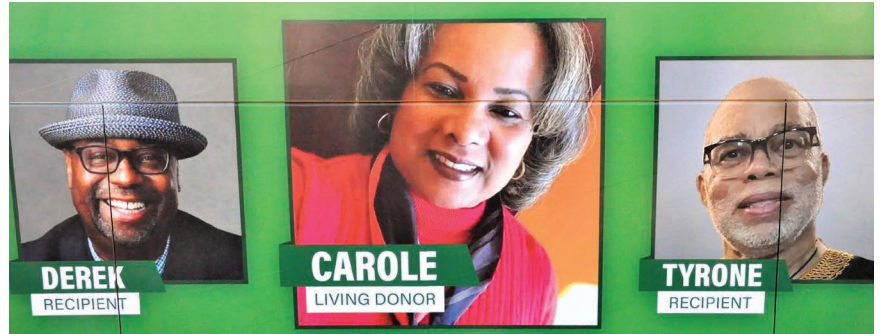

Milwaukee Chapter of the Links Inc., launch Black K.A.R.E. Initiative to raise awareness of kidney disease

On Wednesday, February 18, 2026, the Milwaukee Chapter of The Links, Incorporated along with Mayor Cavalier Johnson and others, unveiled a Milwaukee County Transit System (MCTS) bus designed to promote kidney health across the city.

According to the National Kidney Foundation, Black Americans are three times as likely to develop kidney failure in comparison to white Americans. National Black K.A.R.E. is an initiative that spreads awareness about kidney disease, and that campaign is heading to Milwaukee.

Through participation in the initiative, the Milwaukee Chapter of The Links, Incorporated was granted national

grant funding which will be used to educate residents on disease prevention and treatment -- and part of that education effort will be on wheels with 7 buses circulating in the highly affected neighborhoods, promoting good kidney health through podcasts and presentations, and partnering with community organizations to spread the word. The overall goal is to reduce the risk of chronic kidney disease and kidney failure, to improve outcomes for people living with chronic kidney disease, and to provide information to utilize when speaking to your health care professional, including home dialysis if it is appropriate.

'Sinners' cinematographer Autumn Durald Arkapaw makes Oscars history as 1st Black woman to win category

Arkapaw's win is one of many notable wins at 98th Academy Awards

"Sinners" cinematographer Autumn Durald Arkapaw made history on Sunday, March 15, 2026, as the first woman, the first Filipino and first Black person to win the Oscar for best cinematography.

Arkapaw is only the third woman to be nominated in the category in Academy Awards history. Before winning the award, she had already made history as the first-ever woman of color nominated in the category.

Arkapaw took to the stage with thunderous applause from the crowd at the Dolby Theatre.

"Whenever I say thank you to Ryan [Coogler], he replies and says, 'No, thank you. Thank you for believing in me, and thank you for trusting me.' And that's the kind of guy who I get to make films with," Arkapaw said. "And he means it. He really, truly means it."

She went on to say that she believed that meeting Coogler was destined.

"I feel like I had to meet

him. This little girl that -- their mother, who is over there, told them that they could do anything -- had to meet Ryan," she said.

Arkapaw then asked all of the women in the room to stand up with her.

"I really want all the women in the room to stand up, because I feel like I don't get here without you guys," Arkapaw continued. "I really, really, truly mean that. I have felt so much love from all of the women on this whole campaign."

Coogler's "Sinners" broke an Oscars record with 16 total nominations at the 98th Academy Awards. The film took home four Oscars.

One of the ceremony's most powerful moments came when Michael B. Jordan won best actor for "Sinners." With the victory, he became just the sixth Black man to win the award, joining Sidney Poitier, Denzel Washington, Jamie Foxx, Forest Whitaker and Will Smith — all of whom Jordan acknowledged in a heartfelt speech.

Earlier in the evening, the audience erupted when "Sinners" and Ryan Coogler was announced as the winner for Original Screenplay. This is only the second time in Oscar history a Black writer has won the category, after Jordan Peele for his 2017 film "Get Out."

"Please sit down because I'm very nervous, and they're gonna play me off," Coogler told the crowd, which included his parents. "I grew up in Oakland and Richmond, California and we can talk a lot."

Music is incredibly important to the way the story in "Sinners" is told. The Juke Joint scene has become a well-loved part of the movie that almost a year later, people still are talking about it. So when the cast of "Sinners" came out to perform "I Lied to You" from the film, they decided to go all in and recreate the scene.

Lead actor Miles Canton sang the song as the dancers from the iconic scene per-

formed on stage behind him. Representing Black culture, blues, the Delta and East Asian culture in one performance isn't easy, but "Sinners" did it well. The performance also featured music icons like Buddy Guy, Brittany Howard, Kingfish and Shaboozey.

The surprise came at the end when Misty Copeland, famous American Ballet Theatre principal dancer, came out of retirement weeks after a hip replacement to participate. At that moment, the crowd went wild and the audience gave the cast of "Sinners" a standing ovation.

A favorite winner for many audience members, especially the younger ones, was "KPop Demon Hunters." The film won for Best Animated Feature and Best Original Song.

This marks the first time people of Korean descent have won for the animated category, and the first time a K-pop song has ever won an Oscar. During the night, the voice actors from "KPop Demon Hunters" came out and sang their song "Golden" for the Oscars audience. As they sang, audience members waved light sticks.

Gov. Evers signs bill to expand Medicaid postpartum coverage for WI mothers

The bill will expand coverage for eligible mothers on Wisconsin's Medicaid program, BadgerCare Plus, from 60 days to 12 months after childbirth

Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers signed a bill into state law Wednesday, March 18, 2026, at Children's Wisconsin Hospital in Wauwatosa that expands postpartum care for mothers through the state's Medicaid program, BadgerCare Plus.

Evers said he has pushed for the expansion of care since 2019. He called the move "historic," noting Wisconsin is the 49th state to take this step. It comes after years of pushback from Republican lawmakers and gridlock in the Wisconsin Legislature. Arkansas is the only state yet to expand Medicaid postpartum coverage to a full year.

Advocates and medical professionals argue that the legislation will provide more stability, mental health support and potentially lifesaving help to mothers during the critical postpartum period.



"Those of us who have seen the consequences of this policy not being in place, and those who have borne losses, have used that as fuel to empower a movement that translated into an amazing signature of legislation today," said Lisa Peyton,

founder of The Foundation for Black Women's Wellness.

Evers pointed to data from the Department of Health Services that shows on average, 21 women die every year from pregnancy-related causes in Wisconsin, half of which happen post-partum.

He said 95 percent of those deaths, according to the data, are preventable.

The bill had previously been held up by Republicans

in the legislature, including Speaker Vos. Evers emphasized that lawmakers put politics aside to prioritize Wisconsin mothers.



Small Business Spotlight: Pour Into Me, LLC - Andrea Smith

Some of the most meaningful work is born out of personal loss. For Andrea Smith, the vision behind Pour Into Me, LLC began during one of the most vulnerable moments of her life.

At just 25 years old, Andrea lost her mother, the one person who had always been her guide. At the same time, she was six months pregnant with her first child, preparing to become a mother without the very woman who had shown her how. The weight of that reality settled in quickly.

She remembers sitting in her living room one day, her infant son nearby, overwhelmed by a single question: How do I mother without a mother? With no blueprint and no safety net, she turned to the one place she had always found direction—God.

In that moment, the answer came simply but powerfully: *Be what you need.*

Those words became the foundation for everything that followed. Andrea began reflecting on all the things her mother had poured into her during the 25 years they shared—guidance, accountability, faith, and reassurance. She realized that what she needed most was someone willing to stand in the gap. And if she needed it, chances were others did too.

That realization shifted her focus outward. Instead of remaining in her grief, Andrea began pouring into young girls who carried similar voids—girls navigating life without consistent maternal support, girls searching for identity and affirmation during some of the most impressionable years of their lives.

Pour Into Me was never just an idea. It was a response to a need—one Andrea knew deeply. What started as a



personal act of obedience became a mentorship program rooted in purpose, faith, and the belief that young women flourish when someone takes the time to truly see them.

Mentorship philosophy: Pouring into purpose

Andrea Smith's approach to mentorship is intentional, personal, and deeply rooted in understanding when young girls need guidance the most. She focuses on girls between the ages of 13 and 16—not by coincidence, but by design. Those years, she believes, are when young women are most impressionable, navigating the space between childhood and identity while quietly deciding who they are becoming.

For Andrea, mentorship goes far beyond academics. While grades matter, they represent only a small portion of a young woman's life. What matters just as much, if not more, is how she carries herself, how she treats others, and how she understands her own worth.

At the heart of her philosophy is a simple but powerful message she shares with every girl she mentors: "Fix your sister's crown." A standard that builds the foundation of friendship. Andrea believes friendship isn't about silence or blind loyalty. It's about accountability. If you truly care about someone, you correct them, you protect them, and you help them rise.

Looking ahead: Expanding the impact

When Andrea Smith looks toward the future of Pour Into Me, she doesn't see a program limited by her own reach. She sees a movement, one built on mentorship, structure, and the belief that young girls thrive when they are intentionally guided.

At its core, her vision is expansion with purpose. Andrea hopes to grow Pour Into Me into a mentorship model similar to a Big Brother, Big Sister-style foundation—one that can touch far more lives than she can personally reach. The goal isn't growth



for visibility, but growth for sustainability and impact.

Her heart remains firmly with young girls, particularly those navigating adolescence without consistent guidance. Andrea often speaks about what she sees in her community, especially during the summer months, young girls giving too much of themselves away before fully understanding their value. To her, it's not a matter of judgment; it's a reflection of what's missing.

That's where she believes Pour Into Me belongs.

Andrea envisions the program becoming part of the school system, integrated in a way that values personal development as much as academic achievement. She imagines a space much like traditional core classes where girls are taught how to become women of substance. A place where inner character is nurtured alongside outward confidence, and where young women learn that beauty must exist both inside and out.

For Andrea, this work is about preservation. It's about reaching girls before their sense of self erodes, before confusion turns into insecurity, and before the absence of guidance becomes a permanent wound. She's careful to emphasize that no child is disposable or broken, some are simply in need of direction.

As Pour Into Me grows, Andrea hopes to build a team she can build a team of leaders who understand how to pour into young women with the same care, accountability, and intention she brings to every relationship. By doing so, she believes the mission can extend far beyond her own presence, creating a ripple effect that strengthens communities one young woman at a time.

For Andrea, the future isn't about scale alone, it's about legacy. And she's committed to ensuring that what she pours out today continues to flow long after she's no longer the only one holding the cup.

Celebrating excellence: Investing in our future Black leaders

a mother of three children was enrolled in Reach One, Teach One Mentoring Program in 2006; she desired to become an educator and received several scholarships from ODB for college support. After receiving a Bachelor in Education, Masasha is teaching first grade students and loving her job. Another example of how ODB is investing in future leaders—another mother of three children was enrolled in ODB's Mommy & Baby Program for four years. She received a certificate in Real Estate and established a non-profit agency, Men Stand Up

(Re-Entry Program). Monifa is currently enrolled in Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC), received her first scholarship from ODB for higher education. Monifa is pursuing a Bachelor in Real Estate. There are more success stories, but these few accomplishments reflect not only academic success but leadership, innovation, and generational progress.

Two years ago, ODB strengthened its commitment to youth advancement through a partnership with Barack Obama School of Career and Technical Educa-

tion. Together, the two organizations formed a scholarship committee focused on expanding access to higher education while cultivating leadership skills among students.

Each year, Barack Obama School graduates approximately 70 students. About 20 percent of those graduates pursue college, while the remaining 80 percent enter meaningful employment opportunities. For college-bound students, the ongoing scholarship support helps cover essential needs such as room and board,

school supplies, and clothing—reducing financial barriers that can often derail academic progress.

Additionally, a minimum of five students receive mini scholarships each semester to help sustain their educational journeys. This continued investment reinforces a powerful message: our young Black scholars are seen, valued, and supported.

As both organizations work collaboratively, our shared goal remains clear—develop strong leaders, expand opportunities and build a future rooted in excellence. During Black History Month, we proudly celebrate the achievements of our young leaders, recognizing that they are not only part of Black history—they are actively shaping its future.

Beyond the paycheck: How job insecurity is affecting Black health

As sluggish job creation and rolling layoffs continue to plague the workforce, Black employees have been disproportionately impacted. When data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics revealed that more than 100,000 Black women exited the workforce in 2025—a number that would later balloon to nearly 300,000—many wondered ‘What will happen to their careers?’

However, the more pressing question was ‘What will happen to their health?’ Unemployment, underemployment, and job loss, which includes layoffs, furloughs, and terminations, can adversely affect your health. Job loss can also affect the health of those in your household. For many Black families, the household includes immediate family as well as cousins, aunts, uncles, and elders.

When paychecks stop coming in, the damage extends far beyond lost income. For many Black Americans, unemployment starts as an economic crisis, then spirals into a public health emergency—one that strains the heart, fuels chronic disease, and deepens anxiety and depression. In communities already navigating longstanding inequities in access to care, housing, and economic opportunity, the stress of joblessness can compound existing health

disparities, turning financial instability into lasting physical and mental harm.

Health implications

Job loss can affect health in many ways—for Black communities, these effects can be aggravated by systemic inequities, such as wealth gaps, employment discrimination, and limited access to quality healthcare.

Physical health

Job insecurity can trigger chronic stress, which contributes to high blood pressure, or hypertension. According to Heart.org, about 58 percent of Black adults in the U.S. have the condition, which can lead to heart disease, kidney disease, and stroke. One of the most dangerous things about high blood pressure is how long it can go undetected. If you feel stressed about being unemployed, you may not notice the signs until your physical health is at risk.

Job loss can also affect your physical health by inducing:

- **Poor sleep:** Feeling anxious about your finances or job prospects can lead to insomnia.
- **Weakened immune system:** Stress can make you more susceptible to illness.
- **Chronic illness:** Conditions like diabetes or hypertension may worsen if you lose access to employer-sponsored health insurance, the main source of health coverage in the U.S.

Mental health

Fortunately, the conversation around mental health has expanded in recent years. However, you may not understand just how much job loss can affect your mental well-being until it has already happened. Employment is more than just how you make money—for many, it is also tied to identity and self-

worth. This is especially true in some Black households, where success is defined by the type or level of employment you achieve. Losing your job can make you question yourself and lead to low self-esteem.

In addition, job loss can induce psychological trauma. “Absent a reliable source of income, individuals can start to feel chronically depressed and hopeless,” says Dr. Rheeda Walker, professor of psychology and author of *The Unapologetic Guide to Black Mental Health*. “Anxiety and worry can also set in. It’s important to be aware if depressive and anxious symptoms start to take over the mind because they can undermine one’s capacity to look for that next job, interview effectively, and pivot to the next position.”

Further, for those who experienced unfair treatment at work—like 41 percent of Black employees in a 2023 Pew Research Center study—sudden job loss can feel traumatic and raise questions about whether race played a role in the termination or layoff.

Family impact

Black people have the most expansive definitions of ‘family’, so the household may only include nuclear family members or incorporate extended family as well. In any case, job loss can deeply impact your family dynamic. The financial pressure can strain family relationships, introduce conflict, and cause emotional distress, which can trickle down from elders and parents to young children. And if the lost income results in less money to take family trips, invest in extracurricular activities, or force downsizing, family members may experience long-term instability and disengagement, decreasing the likelihood of surviving the job loss as a unit.

Community impact

Black Americans build community in a variety of ways, including mutual aid and resource sharing. Building and engaging in community supports social health—how we build relationships, interact, and connect. Those who have been laid off, furloughed, or forced into underemployment may isolate themselves, weakening social networks and local communities. Individuals who don’t have stable employment could struggle to support and contribute to those around them, diminishing community health.

How to overcome health implications

Overcoming the health implications of job loss requires intentional, consistent effort. Start with a few strategies that require a small investment, but make a big difference.

Seek community

While you should take time to grieve job loss and process your thoughts, it’s important to seek community. Reach out to former co-workers you enjoyed working with and engage with family and friends who have been through similar situations.

Consider volunteer work to stay productive, join clubs, go to events at your local library, and look into networking events you can attend. “Identify a support system either among current friends or online,” says Dr. Walker. “There are a number of social media groups that support Black adults who are looking for work.” Seeking community as you recover from job loss can help you maintain your overall health.

Manage your health

Moving your body regularly can help you eliminate physical and mental health issues. If a gym membership is not in your budget, ask a friend to use a gym buddy pass, take walks around your neighborhood, or do home-based workouts using online videos. Start and end each day with a stretch routine to stay limber, improve circulation, and lower stress.

Get a blood pressure cuff or use one for free at a local pharmacy. Take advantage of local community health days where free health screenings are offered, or check with organizations like The National Association of Free & Charitable Clinics to access free or low-cost healthcare.

Job loss can make you feel frustrated, angry, resentful, or even hopeless, but channeling those emotions into regular workouts and using free resources to access care can help you proactively manage your health.

Focus on your next step

After you’ve been laid off, furloughed, or terminated, you may find it easy to replay what went wrong or recount what could have been done differently. Instead, focus on your next, whether that’s securing a new job, starting a business, or embarking on a sabbatical. Dr. Walker suggests focusing on what you can control. “The things that are out of one’s control are a distraction from creativity and potentially finding a position (or creating one!) that will take one’s well-being and psychological fortitude to the next level.”

Ultimately, job loss can affect all aspects of your health and the stability you’ve created for yourself, your family, and your community. Structural inequalities mean these impacts can be more severe and longer-lasting for Black individuals and communities. Take the steps to mitigate these potentially lifelong impacts and preserve your health in the process.

Throughout history, Black women have been a driving force in redefining industries, from entrepreneurship to leadership roles across various sectors. This list of inspiring Black businesswomen honors their remarkable achievements and ideas while highlighting their ongoing impact in revolutionizing the business landscape and their contributions to business, the economy, and culture. These entrepreneurs are still breaking barriers today, building successful companies, and creating opportunities for future generations of innovators.

Their contributions shatter stereotypes and demonstrate the power of women in leadership, showing that with vision, support, a plan, and the right resources, they can lead and innovate in any field. Here are eleven inspiring women in business and the industries they have made their mark in:

Architecture and construction



1. Deryl McKissack, CEO of McKissack & McKissack, leads the nation's oldest African American-owned design and construction firm. As a fifth-generation builder, she carries forward the legacy of her ancestor, Moses McKissack, who was born into slavery and learned the building trade while working as a Brick-maker. Today, her firm has played a role in over \$15 billion worth of projects nationwide, shaping skylines and communities while breaking barriers in an industry that has historically excluded Black professionals—especially Black women.

Her impact extends beyond business success. By bringing innovation, and design excellence to major projects, McKissack has helped redefine what leadership looks like in architecture, engineering, and construction. Her firm's work not only advances the trades industry but also paves the way for

more equitable opportunities, proving that representation drives progress.

By her continuing her family's work, she advances the trades industry while paving the way for more inclusive and equitable opportunities, proving that representation drives progress. Black women's leadership in business is critical. It challenges outdated norms, fuels innovation, and helps make spaces more reflective of the diverse communities that live and work in them. When more Black women take the lead in these industries, they create opportunities for the next generation, driving a more dynamic and forward-thinking future.

Agriculture, sustainability and clean beauty



2. Ciara Imani May, Founder of Rebundle.co and a pioneer in science and technology, has created a safe, non-toxic, plant-based alternative to traditional braiding hair. Her biggest success is bridging the gap between lifestyle, function, safety, and sustainability.

A product like this contributes to innovation and representation in STEM by addressing a long-overlooked issue in the beauty industry. It also has the potential to support Black Agriculturists through the sourcing of raw, environmentally friendly materials and could save the lives of millions of women who are at risk of high exposure to unregulated, cancer-causing chemicals commonly found in braiding hair. The Guardian reports that a 2025 analysis revealed that over 80% of more than 4,000 beauty products marketed to Black women contain at least one moderately hazardous ingredient, with many containing multiple such chemicals.

Ciara Imani May exemplifies why Black representation is so important in business. When Black innovators lead, they create solutions that reflect the needs and experiences of their communities. They challenge industries to improve, advocate for safer and more ethical products, and open doors for economic opportunities centered on sustainability and equity. Her

work underscores the power of representation, demonstrating that when Black entrepreneurs are supported, entire industries evolve for the better.



3. Beyoncé, Founder and Chair, and Tina Knowles, Vice Chair, are the powerhouse mother-daughter duo behind Cécred, a clean hair care brand committed to ingredient transparency and ethical sourcing. Formulated without potentially harmful ingredients like artificial dyes, parabens, sulfates, silicones, and mineral oil, Cécred adheres to strict global safety standards and remains cruelty-free. Their definition of "clean" prioritizes both health-conscious formulations and responsible sourcing, setting a new standard in an industry where such transparency is often lacking when it comes to Black consumers.

Inspired by their family's deep-rooted legacy in hair care, Cécred is more than just a brand; it's a continuation of the Knowles family's tradition of celebrating and preserving Black hair. Their biggest success to date is solidifying the largest hair care partnership in beauty retail history with Ulta, a moment that cements their influence and heritage in the industry. This achievement is significant in the hair care market, where Black consumers spend billions each year on hair care products. On average, Black women spend about \$1,000 annually on beauty and hair care—roughly \$83 per month—which adds up to billions collectively. Yet many products are created and owned by companies outside the community.

Cécred's approach is innovative because it challenges the status quo of an industry that has long lacked regulation, when it comes to products formulated for Black hair. Too often, harmful ingredients are found in products marketed to Black consumers, with little oversight or accountability. By centering health, science, and cultural heritage, Beyoncé and Tina Knowles are setting a new precedent for what

Black-owned beauty brands can achieve.

Their leadership further drives the point of why representation is so important. When Black entrepreneurs take ownership of the products designed for their community, it ensures authenticity, better quality, and a stronger commitment to the well-being of consumers. Cécred is proof that when Black creators lead, the industry follows



4. Olivia Watkins and Karen Washington are Agriculturists and Activists who teamed up to create the Black Farmers Fund. They have secured over \$11 million in funding and are successfully supporting Black farmers, business owners, and land stewards. This is important because supporting decentralized leadership promotes community-led decision-making within the food justice space, improves racial equity, and encourages autonomy in the food ecosystem by empowering local food actors and prioritizing their interests. This approach benefits society by driving community impact and cooperation, building strong relationships, and facilitating the sharing of knowledge and resources within the community. These efforts lead to better outcomes in informing public policy on production, distribution, and access to healthy, economical, and culturally relevant foods in Black communities, while reinforcing long-term economic, environmental, and social sustainability. Additionally, they contribute to strengthening supply chain networks, creating more adaptable and equitable food systems.

Black women's representation in farming and business is vital to our society achieving more sustainability because their contributions and ideas continue to promote equitable opportunities and systems that center and bring balance to our communities.

Health and wellness

5. Maria Toler is leading one of the largest venture capital funds focused on women's healthcare,



SteelSky Ventures. She manages \$100 million in total assets, and through her VC firm, she has invested in some of the most innovative companies in women's healthcare.

Healthcare for women in the U.S. has long been underfunded, despite being one of the largest industries. Women's health issues, such as maternal care, reproductive health, and gender-specific diseases, have historically received less attention and investment compared to other sectors, leaving many healthcare needs unmet. Advancing women's health is essential not only for improving the quality of life for millions of women but also for addressing systemic inequities in healthcare access and outcomes. Interestingly, breakthroughs in women's healthcare, like the recent discovery about pre-eclampsia, have revealed how conditions traditionally thought to affect women can be linked to factors involving men's health as well.

Representation of Black women in both venture capital and healthcare is key to breakthroughs and transformation of these industries. When Black women are present in leadership roles, they bring valuable perspectives that are often not considered, making sure that healthcare innovations are truly reflective of everyone's needs. This representation is necessary for promoting equitable and expanded access to healthcare. Additionally, Black women's involvement in venture capital helps drive investments that support healthcare research and policies focused on the well-being of all women, not just a select few.

By prioritizing Black women's leadership in healthcare and venture capital, we can guarantee that research and policies are informed by a wider range of experiences. This leads to more comprehensive and effective solutions, improving societal outcomes by addressing health disparities and promoting long-term wellness for so many more.
