

New Hope Missionary Baptist Church installs new pastor



After 78 years, Reverend Reginald D. Ivy was installed as the third Pastor of the New Hope Missionary Baptist Church, 2433 W. Roosevelt Dr., on Saturday, March 21, 2026. Reverend Ivy acknowledged that he stands on the shoulders of two great pastors – Reverend Raymond L. Lathan who organized New Hope and retired in 1994, and Reverend Dr. Archie L. Ivy, the father of Pastor Reginald Ivy who became pastor in 1995. Dr. Archie Ivy retired in January of 2026.

Out-of-town guests as well as numerous pastors, family members, church members, Wisconsin General Baptist State Convention (WGBSC), Inc. officers, fraternity brothers, and other visitors from around the city and state were in attendance. He is a 28 year Milwaukee Public School teacher. Currently he is a middle school science and health teacher at Milwaukee School of Languages.

On Sunday, March 15, 2026, the Institute for the preservation of African-American Music and Arts (IPAMA), 3200 W. Hampton Ave., recently hosted the 80th birthday celebration of Deacon Ronald Lawrence. Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin he attended Milwaukee's West division high school in 1963, now Milwaukee School of the Arts.

Shortly after graduation, he enlisted and served in the United States Air Force. Ronald was a trailblazer in the state of Wisconsin. He became the first African-American real estate broker at Wauwatosa Realty. Recognizing the barriers, minority, professional faced, he helped strengthen

opportunities in the industry and served as president of the Milwaukee Realist Association for several years.

Milwaukee tax expert shares tips to find hidden credits and avoid costly mistakes before the filing deadline

Nashika Thomas made a mistake on her own taxes 12 years ago that led to her owing money for five years.

"I did my taxes on my own, and I got one wrong number, and I ended up owing for five years," Thomas said.

That mistake led her to start crunching numbers to help others avoid the same trouble as the owner of AmPm Tax Preparation Services.

"That's what made me get into doing taxes and tax planning," Thomas said.

Thomas says there are credits people may already know, like the Earned Income Tax, which helps low to moderate-income workers and families. But there are other credits people may miss.

"There's a lot of credits," Thomas said.

"Homeownership credit

and first-time home-buyers credits," Thomas said.

This includes credits for making energy-efficient improvements on doors and windows, and installing products like solar panels.

The IRS Credit and Deduction Finder can help taxpayers spot these credits with just a few simple questions, which could mean hundreds or thousands of dollars back in their pockets. For speed

and safety, Thomas recommends filing early.

"Don't wait until April 15th. That's the ninth hour. The last minute. You should do it as soon as you can," Thomas said.

If looking ahead to next year, taxpayers should keep their W-4 updated. That document tells employers how much federal income tax to withhold from a paycheck. Failing to update it

could cost money, especially after getting married, having a child, or starting a new job.

"People don't know this—it will keep rolling over," Thomas said.

"Things change throughout the year," Thomas said.

But no matter what changes occur, Thomas has one main piece of advice.

"Just file your taxes," Thomas said.

Taxpayers can also follow these tips to maximize their returns:

- Use IRS tools like the Credit and Deduction Finder and EITC Assistant for quick eligibility checks.
- Review life changes, including marriage, divorce, a new child or dependent, school enrollment, a home purchase, energy upgrades, or a job loss.

• Know the difference between refundable and nonrefundable credits. Refundable credits, like the EITC and Additional Child Tax Credit, can give cash back even if nothing is owed.

• Check state-level credits, as states offer credits separate from federal ones.

• Use good tax software or a professional, as built-in prompts or expert questions help uncover overlooked credits.

• Compare with last year's return to see if you still qualify for the same credits, unless rules have changed.

• Stay updated on IRS changes, because credit eligibility and amounts can change annually.

• Utilize free tax services like United Way's VITA tax services.

What could the SAVE Act mean for Wisconsin voters if passed by Senate?

It was business as usual at the Midtown Voting Center for the first day of early voting.

While voting is underway, Darryl Morin, the national president of Forward Latino, says changes could be on the horizon if the SAVE Act is passed by the Senate.

"The SAVE Act would require Americans of all demographic groups to provide documentation of their citizenship," Morin said.

Groups like Forward Latino, the NAACP, and the League of Women Voters worry the law would make voting more difficult for women, first-time voters and the elderly.

"The law could block married women from voting because their driver's license has their married name on it, but their registration has their maiden name on it," Clarence Nicholas said.

Nicholas, president of the NAACP Milwaukee Branch, expressed concerns about the potential impact on voting locations.

"It creates more red tape and confusion, leading to longer lines and people being turned away at the polls," Nicholas said.

The Wisconsin GOP sent the following statement:

"Every American and Wisconsinite deserves to know that their elections are safe and secure. The SAVE Act is the first step in ensuring voters trust our elections and safeguarding ballot boxes across the nation," stated WisGOP Chairman Brian Schimming.

Multiple viewers reached out to TMJ4 with concerns about how the SAVE Act would impact voters in Wis-

consin if passed.

Wisconsin Representative Tom Tiffany co-sponsored the act. His team sent TMJ4 a statement regarding the legislation.

"Wisconsin already has voter ID, and 63 percent of Wisconsinites voted to enshrine it in our state Constitution. But the reality is many states, including our neighbors Minnesota and Illinois, do not. The SAVE America Act is simple. It requires voter ID in every state and proof of citizenship when regis-

"Acceptable documentation includes a U.S. passport, military ID coupled with a service record, a government-issued photo ID showing a U.S. birthplace, or a government-issued photo ID

paired with a birth certificate or naturalization certificate. The bill also creates a straightforward process for individuals who have changed their name, enabling them to sign an affidavit confirming their citizenship and name change."

The Milwaukee Election Commission has seen confusion firsthand with plenty of phone calls, despite the early stages the act is in.

"There is nothing changing in the law; the SAVE Act

hasn't even passed, it still has many steps it has to go through," Paulina Gutiérrez, executive director of the Milwaukee Election Commission, said.

If you plan to vote early or are heading to the polls on April 7, the Milwaukee Election Commission says it is a good idea to be prepared regardless of what happens with the SAVE Act.

"If you have moved, or changed addresses, even apartment numbers, you need to re-register to vote," Gutiérrez said.

A century of grace: Eva Hayes celebrates 100 years

On Saturday, March 7, 2026, Eva Mae Hayes celebrated her 100th birthday at the Saint Kate Arts Hotel in downtown, surrounded by generations of loved ones. In honor of the occasion, she received a proclamation from Milwaukee Mayor Cavalier Johnson, a Common Council plaque, and a centurion proclamation from Sardis, Mississippi. Held during Women's History Month, the celebration honors a life of service, purpose, and enduring influence. Born in Sardis, Mississippi, she married Robert in 1947 and later moved to Milwaukee, where

she built a life rooted in faith, family, and service, including 18 years with Milwaukee Public Schools. Through life's joys and challenges—including the loss of her daughter, Gale—her faith has remained her cornerstone, reflected in more than 70 years of devoted membership at Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church. As the matriarch of the Farmer and Hayes families and through 62 years of marriage, she leaves a legacy of faith, unconditional love, strength, and unity that continues to inspire generations.

Small Business Spotlight: Sherman Park Grocery

Maurice Wince, affectionately known as “Moe”, along with his wife, Yashica Spears are the owners of Sherman Park Grocer, is the driving force behind Sherman Park Grocer, and his presence in this area is especially significant given the food desert status of the surrounding community. Although he was born in Illinois, he is deeply rooted in the fabric of Milwaukee. His mom moved to Milwaukee when he was an infant and has lived in the Sherman Park neighborhood since high school. As we delve into the founding story, community collaborations, and the ongoing mission in a designated food desert, we will highlight his passion, intentionality and the quality of food and service offered in the community.

Inspiration and mission

Moe shared that the concept for Sherman Park Grocer began during a period of civil unrest in the community. Alongside other stakeholders, including Bishop Walter Harvey, Senior pastor of Embassy MKE (formerly Parklawn Assembly) responded with the motto, “not in our backyard.” After holding town hall meetings, listening sessions, cookouts, and backyard gatherings, the goal of the stake holders was to identify and address community pain points.

Throughout these sessions,

basic needs such as food, clothing, and shelter surfaced as urgent concerns. Residents noted that their needs were not being met and described poor conditions of local amenities, such as laundromats. This feedback inspired a shift toward community-centered action, beyond the church walls.

The Sherman Park neighborhood, with 40,000 residents, lacked a full-scale grocery store for years, leaving families dependent on gas stations for groceries. This neighborhood is one of fourteen identified food deserts in the area, exacerbating the challenges for single mothers and families.

Building community resources

The team succeeded in opening a laundromat,

event studio and commercial kitchen, Upstart Kitchen, a 24-hour commercial kitchen that now supports 18 to 24 food entrepreneurs. The final step was establishing a grocery store, a crucial step for both advancing the kingdom of God and rebuilding the community. The lack of access to affordable, nutritious food has led to high rates of childhood obesity, diabetes, and hypertension. The new grocery store provides fresh fruits, vegetables, and other healthy options, countering the prevalence of unhealthy snacks from gas stations. Sherman Park Grocer prides itself in highlighting local products, including hot sauce, coffee, shampoo, and lavender lemonade. Many of which is sourced from Upstart Kitchen entrepreneurs. This approach supports local artists and businesses, rein-

forcing the store’s commitment to “buy local, support local.”

Collaboration, ownership, and spiritual foundation

While the store’s foundation is spiritual and guided by a mission to improve lives, the business is independently owned and operated. Embassy Center and other organizations serve as partners and collaborators with a commitment to serving the community in the spirit of stewardship and generosity.

This is shown in their partnership with other organizations, including Milwaukee Area Technical College’s (MATC) Fast Fund program, providing space for local culinary students, and Alverno nursing students, who teach healthy cooking classes and provide educational materials. As well, participation in Feeding America’s Food Ambassador program deepened his focus on addressing food insecurity and promoting nutrition. He sees the grocery store as a capstone project, embodying the lessons learned about food justice, community building, and the importance of nutrition.

In addition, it has been a pivotal point for Maurice and Yashica to ensure that they are here for the community at large. Partnering with many churches who operate food pantries the option to

provide gift cards to their members, allow families to shop for what they need with dignity and within the guidelines of supporting healthy food choices.

The store’s charitable arm, Feed My Sheep Global Services, works in partnership with local churches and organizations. Gift cards are provided to those in need, with stipulations that funds be used for nutritious staples. The program is rooted in stewardship and accountability, ensuring that they support healthy choices for families.

And as they are preparing to celebrate four-year anniversary on July 26, 2026, Moe’s goal is to build more partnerships that align with the mission of addressing food insecurity and supporting access to affordable groceries.

Collaboration and scale

Today, Sherman Park Grocer is the only African American full-scale grocery store in the state, offering fresh produce and a soul food deli; providing specials such as oxtails, smothered pork chops, turkey legs, meatloaf, catfish, chicken wings, shrimp, coleslaw, and spaghetti. Catering services are available for churches, weddings, receptions, and repasts, with experience serving

What the judges said to them afterward, though, might have made an even bigger impression.



Chief Judge Maxine Aldridge White told the students she was born the eighth of 11 children to sharecroppers in rural Mississippi. No one in her family had gone to college. Society's rules aren't always fair, she said, but she persisted and earned three

degrees.

From there she became an assistant U.S. attorney in Wisconsin's Eastern District, a Milwaukee County circuit judge, chief circuit judge, Wisconsin appellate judge, and then chief judge of the Court of Appeals.

She was the first Black woman federal prosecutor in the Eastern District, the first Black chief judge in Milwaukee County Circuit Court, and the first Black woman on the Court of Appeals.

Milwaukee County Chief Circuit Judge Carl Ashley, who moderated the event, reinforced her message.

"Realize that the sky's the limit. Don't let anybody marginalize your goal. You can go as far as you want and more. Don't take no for an answer; just keep working at it. Study hard — get your homework in early," he said.

Chief Circuit Judge Ashley noted, "I was the first lawyer

in my family." Now, his sister is a lawyer, his niece is a lawyer and a circuit judge, and his daughter is a lawyer.

He speculated that students in the auditorium might be thinking, "There's nobody in my family who's ever been a lawyer."

"You can do that," and set an example for family and friends at the same time, he said.

Students leave inspired

Marina Lisberg, a sophomore at Rufus King, said

seeing a session of court in action gave her a new perspective about law and made her feel she could aspire to be a lawyer or judge. Hearing one attorney make an analogy to ordering pizzas in his argument was a revelation — "I didn't know it could be that casual," she said, imagining arguments only in formal, serious terms.

"I feel like it inspired a lot of people — people who were already considering law or who haven't considered it before. It was a rare opportunity; I'm grateful to be a part

of it," Marina said.

King freshman London Wilks agreed. "It really inspired me to pursue what I want to pursue," he said.



A tribute to retiring Chief Judge White

The event at Rufus King on Thursday, March 19, 2026 included a tribute to Chief Judge White, who is retiring in April after a legal career of more than 30 years.

"You made our justice system better. You made it more inclusive, you made it more equitable, and you did the hard work it takes to get there," Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice Rebecca Frank Dallett said after oral arguments and a question-and-answer session with students ended. "I want to thank you, Chief Judge White, for dedicating your entire career to making our justice system in Milwaukee County and the State of Wisconsin better, fairer, and more accessible."

By having Black women lead and innovate in these spaces, they can make sure that Black history is documented accurately, thoroughly, and with the cultural sensitivity it deserves. Their work helps fill gaps in historical records and provides future generations with a richer, more complete understanding of their heritage.



8. Tynesia Boyea-Robinson is the President and CEO of CapEQ, a firm that

partners with companies and investors to bring equity into their day-to-day operations. Through consulting and advisory services, CapEQ helps businesses improve profits, performance, and growth while keeping social impact at the forefront. OFFICE OF THE MILWAUKEE COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSION

TO THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKEE:

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in City of Milwaukee on April 7, 2026, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

***If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

****If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device ("ExpressVote")* to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan ballot**, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it may be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the

ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.
