MATC hosts 2026 spring commencement, honors outstanding achievers and vets

On Saturday, May 16, 2026, Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC) hosted its 2026 spring commencement ceremony at Fiserv Forum. The commencement speaker for this year's ceremony was Lutheran Social Services of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan President and CEO Héctor Colón. The spring 2026 graduating class had more than 1,800 students eligible for degrees, diploma and certificates. More than 600 earned scholastic honors, there were 90 dual enrollment students, and 48 veterans who wore red, white and blue cords symbolizing their service.

This year's student speaker was Mustafa Yusof who received an associate degree in business management. Also on hand was Trevor D'Souza, senior vice president at Associated Bank and a member of the MATC Foundation Board of Directors, announced that the Foundation had contributed \$1,000 in Colón's name to the college's Student Success Fund

Scholarship.

He also said the Foundation had given graduation gifts to Yusof and to the President's Award winner, Quiana Wilder, who earned an associate degree from MATC's Early Childhood Education program. The President's Award recognizes student achievement and contributions to the college and the community. Also recognized at the ceremony was Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Student Channetta Winfield who earned a Culinary Arts Degree. Winfield was born deaf, the result of her mother contracting German measles while pregnant. But that has not stopped Winfield from following her passion for all things culinary.

Zion Hill MBC hosts 66th Church Anniversary

On Sunday, May 18, 2025, Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church hosted its "66th Church Anniversary Celebration," at 1825 West Hampton Ave. with a theme of, "We will never forget." - Deuteronomy Ch.6:1-12.

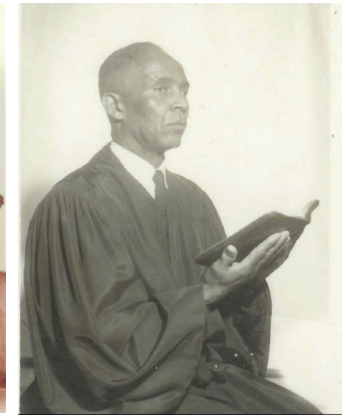
The history of the Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church is rare among local churches as it organized in a private residence. It is the only Black Church in the City of Milwaukee to build three sanctuaries from the ground. The inception of the Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church is the seed planted by the Holy Spirit in the heart of the late Reverend Obie B. Sartin, Sr. Reverend Sartin had a biblical based motive for organizing the Church.

Organized by Rev. Obie B. Sartin, Sr. on May 10, 1959, this "mission" was organized into a "church" with just nine chartered members and was held at the north side home of the Sartin's residence, at 2771 North 18th Street. This effort was sanctioned and approved by the Wisconsin General Baptist State Convention. The church was so named, "Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church," and proudly called as its first pastor, the Reverend Obie B. Sartin, Sr. His wife, Mrs. Synovia Sartin, became the First Lady.

On November 8, 1960, Zion Hill purchased a vacant lot at 1501 West Ring Street. On December 8, 1960, exactly one month after the lot was purchased; ground was broken for this structure. Joyously and trium-

phantly, on the morning of June 4, 1961, Pastor Sartin and the devoted membership of Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church proudly marched from the original location at 2771 North 18th Street to the newly built edifice at 1501 West Ring Street.

After worshipping at the 1501 West Ring Street location for some 17 years, Pastor Sartin realized that again, through the blessings of God, the membership had outgrown the facility. On December 7, 1976, the church acquired two vacant lots located at 1825 West Hampton Avenue. The pilgrimage of the congregation, led proudly by Pastor Sartin into the new house of worship, took place on October 8, 1978. Pastor Sartin continued to lead the congregation until his passing on July 21, 1985. Later that year, Reverend Russell B. Williamson was called to pastor. As the church continued to grow, the building expanded to occupy the second lot on 1825 West Hampton Avenue and continues to worship at this location today. Regretfully, July, 1996, Mother Synovia Sartin, the beloved wife of the late Reverend Obie B. Sartin, Sr. and the First Lady Emeritus of the Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church passed away. Rev. Russell B. Williamson and his wife Jenell Williamson, now serve the Zion Hill community.





Milwaukee County suicide report reveals post-pandemic rise among Black residents, men, older adults

A new Milwaukee County report shows suicides among Black residents, men, older adults, and firearm-related deaths all rose after the COVID-19 pandemic. For Sylvester Jackson, those numbers are not just data — they are personal.

"It's not about statistics, it's much about human beings' lives," Jackson said.

Jackson knows the weight of that reality firsthand. Years of trauma, abuse, addiction, and loss pushed him to a breaking point while serving time in prison.

"Young men from the age of 7, you know, to the age of 13, sexually abused, mentally abused, physically abused, spiritually misled, Jackson said. "When you get tired of being hurt, you start learning how to hurt other people."

"When you get so far down to where you feel there's no hope, the only thing left for you is to just call it a day," Jackson said.

That hopelessness eventually led Jackson to attempt to take his own life behind

bars.

"I just felt hopeless, and at that particular time in prison, I just went out to tell the guard that, you know, I feel like harming myself, and I was ordered back to my room, and I would think, OK, they don't care. Why don't I care, you know, why should I?... so I went in my room, and I took all the pills that I had, which was a lot, and I just started swallowing," Jackson said.

Another inmate saw what was happening and helped save his life.

"I was spared so that I can help spare someone else's life," Jackson said.

Today, Jackson runs Believers for Change, helping people facing trauma, addiction, and mental health struggles.

"We want them to know it's there and it's possible if they want to do it," Jackson said.

He believes real change requires going directly to the people who need help most.

"We can't sit in the office and ask people to come see us. We have to go out there and see the peoples in their space... I'm here to tell you there is a better way out," Jackson said.

"You won't get it by sending out flyers; you have to go out there and engage people and find out what's the temperature of this neighborhood," Jackson said.

"You wasn't delivered for you. You were delivered to be an example for somebody else," Jackson said.

Jackson also pointed to systemic conditions as a driver of the crisis.

"When you create destitution... you're creating a vacuum of violence, hopelessness, despair," Jackson said.

"If we're not addressing the cause of something, how are we going to resolve it?" Jackson said.

"If we're not looking at what caused the root of that problem, how we really going to address it?" Jackson said.

The county report found firearm-related suicides in Milwaukee County rose more than 20 percent, now making up more than half of all suicides countywide.

Dr. Ben Weston, Milwaukee County's chief health policy advisor, said the scale of the increase stood out.

"We knew that there was an increase in firearms, but just the amount of increase, I think, was surprising," Weston said.

Weston said Black residents were among those most affected by the post-pandemic shift.

"Black populations in particular had a rise in suicidal

activity before versus after the pandemic," Weston said.

He also pointed to loneliness as a factor driving risk among older adults.

"Loneliness as people get older, can become depression. It can become anxiety," Weston said.

Weston said younger people are also facing significant pressures.

"Younger populations are incredibly affected by mental health issues, by loneliness, by social media pressures," Weston said.

Greg Wesley, president and CEO of the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, said the report's findings on who is most at risk were not what he anticipated.

"I don't know if I expected it to be focused on African American males and older populations," Wesley said.

Wesley said the report sends an important message to those who are struggling.

"Those who are suffering know that people are paying attention," Wesley said.

County leaders said the report will help guide future suicide prevention efforts across Milwaukee. Weston said reaching out for help can start with a single step.

"The first step can be simple... and that's to call 988," Weston said.

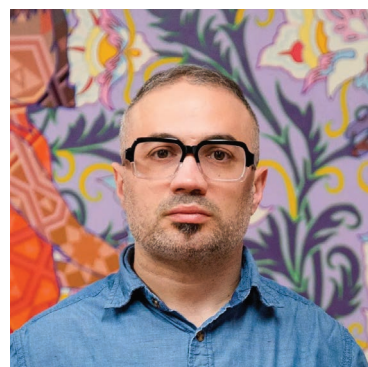
Artists David Najib Kasir and Ojumire Dounfola Charleston were named the 2026 Artists of the Year, while Ferne Yangyeitie Caulker and Karl Kopp were named the 2026 Friends of the Arts.

2026 is the fourth year that the Milwaukee Arts Board accepted award nominations from the public, seeking nominees whose work aligns with the Arts Board purpose as defined by the Code of Ordinances. All award recipients will be honored on June 9, 2026, at 4:30 p.m. in the City Hall Rotunda. Local arts organizations receiving MAB-sustaining grants will be recognized as well.

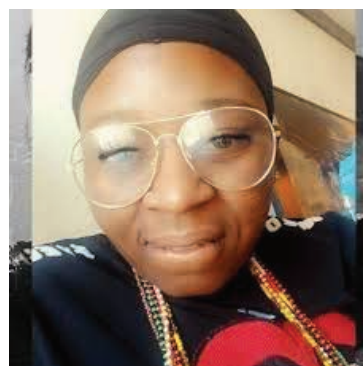
This year's honorees are:



David Najib Kasir, 2026 Mildred L. Harpole Artist of the Year

Kasir interrogates the role Western media plays in constructing cultural narratives, while centering a caring lens on the destruction of Syria, the Middle East, and its people through large-scale paintings. The work starts from a

personal place. "Iraq was my father's country, and Syria is my mother's as well as the second home of my youth. It's where my extended family were living. It's where there were buildings I slept in and streets where I played tag and other games as a child. I've witnessed years of destruction of my countries from US invasions, with no regard from Western media of civilian casualties. I entrap the Syrian landscapes in Arab mosaic patterns, not as a backdrop, but as a culture of people trying to hold up their structured environment as best as they can with little to no help from others."



Ojumire Dounfola Charleston, 2026 Mildred L. Harpole Artist of the Year

"Ojumire" Charleston is the founder of Drums Up Guns Down 414 (DUGD414) and has become deeply dedicated to her purpose of using West African drumming, dance, and culture to uplift youth and strengthen community resilience. Beginning on the drums at age 9, her journey grew from church and school bands into a lifelong commitment to cultural arts, community performance, and mentorship throughout Milwaukee and beyond. From a young age to now, Ojumire has consistently provided drumming and cultural performance for many of Milwaukee's community gatherings, cultural celebrations, youth programs, ceremonies, festivals, and healing spaces, becoming a familiar presence in the city's cultural arts community. Through DUGD414, founded in 2023, she leads culturally rooted programming that gives youth and families opportunities to study West African drumming, dance, rhythm, leadership, performance, and cultural history in safe, healing spaces centered around mentorship, social-emotional development, cultural identity, community engagement, and creative expression. Through performances, workshops, drum circles, rites of passage programming, and community outreach, Ojumire continues using the arts as a pathway toward healing, empowerment, unity, and positive change throughout Milwaukee.

"A child who hears the drum of purpose will not

dance to the noise of destruction," Charleston said. "Through DUGD414, I pour into the youth so that they may know their value, honor their roots, and become the strength of the next generation for the community of Milwaukee."



Ferne Yangyeitie Caulker, 2026 Friend of the Arts

Dancer and choreographer Ferne Yangyeitie Caulker was born in Sierra Leone and studied with the National Dance Company of Ghana at the University of Ghana. In 1969, Caulker founded the Ko-Thi Dance Company with a vision to develop, educate, showcase, and preserve African, Caribbean, and African American dance and music in Milwaukee. Under her direction, Ko-Thi has introduced African and Caribbean dance, music, history, and traditions to over ONE MILLION children through school residencies and community collaborations.

"I am deeply honored to be an artist. To be able to share these delicious art forms from the continent of Africa, in a world which needs to celebrate the vast array of human expressions of self affirming and historic values, is a gift. The arts must continue to be sustained and flourish as they remain at the heart of our human experience on the planet, a connective tissue to human history and roots from which we can all bloom."



Karl Kopp, 2026 Friend of the Arts

Karl Kopp's leadership and advocacy have strengthened connections between artists, patrons, and the broader public. When Karl opened Elsa's on the Park on New Year's Eve, 1979, he made a decision that instead of owning a private collection, he would indulge and delight his patrons with a sensory experience that included a contemporary art collection of five installations yearly, including his famous avant-garde Christmas tree collection. These installations are presented only to be experienced, not sold, and are photographed, made into postcards and presented to the diner with the bill. Elsa's covers the postage ensuring an unexpected secondary life for the stationary artwork. While diners may come for a drink, they are exposed to curated and sophisticated art. With these collabora-

tions, Mr. Kopp weaves contemporary art into a part of daily life.

The Artists of the Year program was inaugurated in 1995 by former Alderman and MAB Chair Wayne Frank. The Artists of the Year Award was renamed in 2020 in honor of the late, beloved arts board member Mildred L. Harpole. Each recipient receives a \$1,500 cash award. Funds used to launch the first award included a memorial bequest in honor of Milwaukee artist and former MAB member Jim Chism. Additional funds for the award come from MAB members.

Established in 2012, the Friends of the Arts Award is given to individuals who, often behind the scenes, have distinguished themselves through exceptional service to Milwaukee's arts community.

The MAB sustaining grant program is funded by the City of Milwaukee, with support from the Wisconsin Arts Board, the State of Wisconsin, and the National Endowment for the Arts. MAB also awards matching funds annually for public art conservation.
